Abstract: Following the 2017 #MeToo movement, did political elites in Congress, especially women, represent the policy goals of the #MeToo movement within their legislative agendas and professional profiles? Based on previous theories, the #MeToo movement should have been too weak to force representatives to participate in an electoral exchange. Yet, the increased number of women elected to Congress in 2018 and 2020 suggest #MeToo had the capacity to produce an exchange. To answer this question, I create an entrepreneurial exchange model, where political elites incur risk to appeal to a movement. This risk is mitigated by several personal factors for the politician, including gender and other intersecting identities. I additionally contribute a novel typology for classifying how a movement’s policy goals are represented within the text of legislation. I utilize multiple methods to test my theory, including a survey experiment, large-n regressions, and text analysis. I find that the sponsorship and introduction of movement legislation increased from 2015-2020. Women and legislators of color were most likely to support #MeToo legislation but had to contend with partisanship within Congress and their districts to make the legislation into law.
