My dissertation examines how political symbols, particularly the Constitution and Office of the President, are both used and modified by social movements to frame policy goals. The dissertation was completed under the direction of James A. Morone (chair), Corey Brettschneider, Ross E. Cheit, and Michael Tesler (U.C. Irvine). Through a combination of in-depth case studies from the 1930s (the American Liberty League and the Townsend Clubs) and today (the Tea Party and Occupy Wall Street), I define political religion as the practice of engaging in religious exegesis when reading and debating political texts. The result is an "us versus them" politics based around conversion and crusade, with both political parties vying for converts. The project not only brings the A.C.R. back into political science, but also contributes to the study of American political thought more generally.
